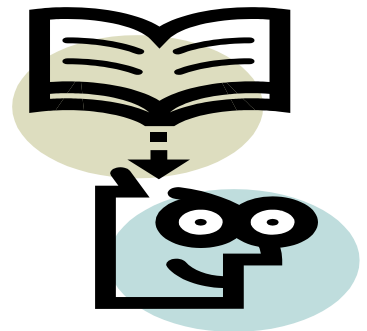

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What's Cooking?

Pigs in A Blanket

What you will need:

1 Package of hotdogs (8)

1 can of Pillsbury Pop-N-Fresh Biscuits

2 slices of cheese (optional)

Ketchup and Mustard for dipping

A sharp knife

A rolling pin

Wax paper

Cookie Sheet

Large tooth picks

Using a knife, carefully cut the hotdogs into 4 equal size pieces, and set them aside.

Open the biscuits and one at a time put them on a piece of wax paper, and gently roll them flat. Again using the knife, cut the flattened biscuits into 4 equal pieces. Cut each slice of cheese into 4 squares and wrap one square with each piece of the hot dog in a piece of the biscuit overlapping the biscuit dough on the underneath side. Place them on the cookie sheet with overlapped dough on the bottom and bake according to the directions on the biscuit container. And finally, put a toothpick in each one and serve with ketchup or mustard for dipping.
