

Service Learning

Grades K—8

What is Service Learning?

One-third of the US population is under the age of 30. Through Service Learning, young people are able to help make their communities healthier, smarter, greener, safer, kinder, and fairer.

Service Learning helps you put some of the things you learn in school into action and it brings school work to life. As you gain experience you are learning to become an active citizen, not just an observer. It also helps you to meet new people and explore your talents while helping others.

Do I have to do it?

No, but get ready, because when you are in 9th grade, service will be a part of your social studies grade. Start now and you are sure to want to continue helping others. It's fun, you make new friends and learn that you can make a difference in our community and the world !

- Check the “What Counts” list to make sure your hours will count.
- Use a new log sheet each year to record your service hours.
- Begin counting service hours on June 1 and end on May 31.
- Estimate your May hours.

Students in grades K-8 may count hours where service to the school and community are pre-formed. Students in grades 9-12 are encouraged to participate in activities that benefit the broader community.

1. You may participate in service with a school club, such as a baking club, K-Kids, Builders Club, Green Thumbs, Reading Buddies or Best Buddies. While all meetings do not count, the times when you are planning and doing service for the school or community do count.
2. You can work on a service project through Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H, or a youth group at your place of worship.

Participate in your family's volunteer activities. Maybe you know someone who needs help because they have Alzheimer's Disease, Autism, or some other limitation. You could participate in a 'walk' or visit an elderly-infirm neighbor to read to them, run errands or walk their dog.
3. Invent your own service project. If you care about animals, kids in need, a park near your house or even a global concern, then recruit your friends and family and plan a way to make a difference.
4. Turn your school work into service by using what you are learning to help tutor younger students or people in the community.

Partial List

1. Mentoring younger students or scouts; coaching younger athletes; being a teaching assistant at your place of worship
2. Making cards or placemats for hospital patients
3. Going to vote with your family (one hour of service)
4. Walk-A-Thons: 5 hours of service with proof of participation and a minimum \$20 donation
5. Actual time spent in performance at or for a charitable event
6. Mission trips where service to the community is performed (worship, eating and sleeping hours do not count)
7. Assisting elderly or infirmed neighbors
8. Caring for the animals of elderly or infirmed neighbors or helping at a group animal shelter

1. Things for which you receive a grade in school
2. Family activities, such as taking care of siblings and grandparents, taking out the trash or setting the table
3. Activities that you do for an able bodied neighbor, such as lawn care, helping to move, etc
4. Participating on an athletic team or doing things to help your own team (part of membership)
5. Activities where you pay to learn a skill such as dance, film or athletics
6. Babysitting
7. Fostering a pet (you may count up to 49 hours per year)
8. Participation in the choir, ushering, or playing music at your place of worship

Many schools and clubs collect donations for very worthy causes. Books, non-perishable food, clothing, coats and the like, help people in our community and the region. However, it is the **activity** of planning the collection, sorting, cleaning and delivering the items that will help you earn service hours. Items themselves have no hourly value with the exception of our Toys for Tots campaign where one toy with a value of \$5.00, or greater, may count for one service hour. It is our hope that our students are actually doing the shopping for the toys and will therefore receive credit for this activity.
